A Curriculum to Challenge, Intrigue, and Develop Young Minds

The Sandusky County Board of Developmental Disabilities operates the School of Hope in Fremont.

We provide access to the Ohio Extended Standards to our students. These are provided in ways that assist each student to meet their maximum academic potential.



We also provide support for the students to learn independent living skills as well as vocational skills to support their transition from school to adulthood.

Our Transition Specialist works with the students to explore vocational opportunities in the community, while other staff members assist them in learning independent living skills within the school setting.

The School-Age Program is for children ages six through 21. Students are referred by their local school districts.

Placement at the School of Hope is determined by the student's Individualized Education Plan (IEP), which is reviewed annually.

Individualized Education Plan

The IEP is a document that is designed to meet your child's unique educational needs. The IEP guarantees the necessary supports and services that are agreed upon and written for your child. The IEP is prepared with parents and/or guardians, local school district staff, and a representative of the School of Hope.

Special education is a set of services, rather than a specific place for your child to go. The services your child needs to reach the goals and objectives and how they'll be delivered are identified in his or her IEP.

School Age Classes

The School of Hope has three school age classrooms:

- Primary
- Intermediate
- Transitional

The focus of these classes is to provide essential academic skills as well as the functional skills necessary for independence and success in everyday life.



All classrooms follow policy and procedures established by the Ohio Department of Education and the Standards established by IDEA (the Federal law mandating services for special needs students).
